Recently, I was reminded of RuckusRoots' founding belief:

Art has the power to inspire positive change and plays a crucial role in fostering social, economic and environmental justice for all.

As our organization grows and our communities evolve, this belief is what I continue to come back to, asking myself, "Is this still true?"

Every time, my answer is yes. The art we make is multifaceted, but art is at the core of everything we do at RuckusRoots. The reason for this is that art changes lives. And if we want to build stronger, more sustainable Los Angeles communities, art is one of the most powerful tools we have to create positive and lasting change. In response to the pandemic, most of our programming took place in garden spaces in 2022, which offered a wonderful synergy with our arts and environmental focus.

2022 was a monumental year for RuckusRoots. Highlights include:

- A 200-foot native plants mural in Sun Valley
- Hiring a new programs coordinator and expanding our South LA team
- Graduating 15 systems-impacted youth in our art, urban gardening and entrepreneurial internship, The Rebel Garden Project
- Winning the 2022 LA 2050 Grant Challenge to make Los Angeles a better place to live by the year 2050
- Breaking ground on a native plants and art garden in Hawthorne, CA

A new SRI Education report that shows only 11% of California public schools currently meet the statewide mandate for arts education. RuckusRoots is dedicated to continuing to fill that void, and to rewriting the story of our communities and our planet through art. THE MISSION:

<u>RuckusRoots' mission</u> is to create art programs that cultivate environmental awareness and action in under-represented communities. Our goal is to foster inspired, empowered and engaged citizens through interactive art-making.

THE WHY: The arts have always been at the forefront of monumental societal shifts, building empathy, understanding and bridging the gap between problem and solution. But, accessible artistic programming is lacking in the communities we serve and simultaneously, these communities are disproportionately and negatively impacted by environmental injustices like litter, pollution and a lack of green spaces. Our programs offer art-making as an essential tool for addressing these injustices.

THE HOW:

We collaborate with local artists, communities and schools to create accessible programs that build interdisciplinary arts skills, uncovering and confronting environmental issues that impact the community.

 - 2. Use art to bring awareness to social and environmental challenges confronting communities.
 - 3. Amplify the voices of marginalized groups
 - 4. Share resources with local artists from the communities where we work

Collaborator Impact Story:

"My name is Erica Montelongo, born and raised in South Central, Los Angeles. I am one of the founders and caretakers of Rebel Garden at Chuco's Justice Center.

Rebel Garden started in 2019 with three small crates, and now contains raised beds, a greenhouse, and a curriculum for students at FREE L.A High School through our collaboration with RuckusRoots.

Having the power to be self-sustaining even in limited spaces is crucial to our autonomy as a black and brown community; we have been disconnected from our gardening/farming practices, and stewardship of our lands. Our goal is to create a garden where community members can learn to grow/ harvest food and also utilize the space for healing."




STUDENT INTERNS SELF-REPORTED CONFIDENCE INCREASES ACROSS CONTENT AREAS:






FIRST & ONLY native plant school garden in the city of Hawthorne!

Our forthcoming native garden will provide students with a beautiful, safe and nurturing connection to nature, while serving as an outdoor classroom for Eucalyptus teachers and RuckusRoots facilitators to engage students with hands-on opportunities for sustainable art-making and garden caretaking.

We've already begun re-wilding this 750 sq-ft lawn through removal of a non-native Eucalytpus tree, grass removal, and by adding mulch and top soil to prep the ground for planting spring ' 23!





CLOSING THE "NATURE GAP"

This project will help alleviate the need for accessible, natural space for youth and also create an outdoor space for future arts programming by RuckusRoots.

We've made it part of our working model to empower and share resources with local Angelenos, artists and leaders working within their communities as a part of our commitment to provide more equitable arts access to our city's more vulnerable communities.

A self-proclaimed materials and processes geek influenced by nature, geometry and the development of organic matter, James merges art and technology with sustainable resources and practices whenever possible.







